The Heart of Early Childhood Education: Teaching Social and Emotional Resilience in Young Children

A Panel Discussion (Virtual)

Wednesday, April 6 3:00 - 4:30 p.m.

DIEEC, in partnership with the University of Delaware Lab School, is hosting a panel discussion with early childhood advocates to discuss and reflect on the critical need for young children to develop the skills to be resilient. Through a question-and-answer format, they will address how promoting resilience in young children is an investment in our future - resilient children become productive and healthy citizens.

Participants are invited to view four ten-minute videos featuring staff from our Lab School and other leaders in the field. They share strategies for increasing young children's skills in self-regulation, managing emotions, and interacting with peers.

The Career Pathways Team

What supports do you need to build your skill levels and improve the quality of your program? This question is what DIEEC addressed as we realigned our work to better help the early childhood professional navigate the early childhood landscape.

The next several REACH issues will include spotlights on our teams committed to providing strategies for quality outcomes.

For the first spotlight, meet the Career Pathways Team, including Veronica Commodore, Melissa Schulte, and Angie Riley. This team is focused on providing early childhood teachers with the professional learning support needed to be successful in their careers.

Their first undertaking is managing and facilitating CDA cohorts - groups of professionals working together on obtaining the CDA credential facilitated by one of our professional development coordinators. By way of background, the CDA® national credentialing program is a professional development opportunity for early childhood professionals working in various settings to demonstrate their knowledge, skills, and abilities in the early childhood education field.

We are halfway through supporting our Child Development Associate® (CDA) credential cohorts that began in January and are getting great feedback. As an update, we are working with more than 90 early childhood professionals in five different cohorts, including one focused on family child care and one for Spanish-speaking educators.

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CHILD DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATE® (CDA) PROFESSIONAL PREPARATION

Invest in your professional development and learn effective teaching practices in early childhood education. By completing the following steps, you will get all the support you need to receive your CDA.

STEP 1
You must have:

Diploma/GED completionprior to application.

480 teaching hours in your CDA area (within a 3 year period prior to application)

STEP 2: Join a CDA Professional Portfolio Preparation Cohort.

- During this cohort you will work on the steps to prepare your CDA portfolio in the age group you selected: Infant/toddler, preschool, or family child care.
- Complete 120 hours of formal early childhood education training; participants must have completed, be enrolled in or willing to complete during the cohort.
- Personalized coaching and networking opportunities.
- Professional development for portfolio preparation.
- One to three meetings/month
 Quality assured hours
- Support and preparation for observation visit and exam.
- Offered in both English and Spanish.
