Spotlight on the Professional Learning Experience "The Business of Early Childhood: Leadership Cohort"

We are taking a different approach to this issue's "Voices from the Field" installment. We are hearing from early childhood educators recently taking the DIEEC professional learning experience (PLE), "The Business of Early Childhood: Leadership Cohort." This PLE series brought together leaders in the field to build skills to help improve the quality and culture of their programs while supporting each other.

A group of about ten participants in Sussex County, Del. began meeting in September to participate in the first module, "The Business of Early Childhood: Your Purpose, Passion, and Position as a Leader." In this PLE, leaders learned about the importance of self-reflection and self-awareness and developed their understanding of how their values and beliefs shaped their leadership styles. Each participant identified their leadership style, learned the difference between leadership and management, and shared personal and program core values.

"This module helped me be open-minded and not be so hard on myself," said Mary Akins of Smart Start Learning Center. "I also understand that my staff has a different sense of ownership than I have."

ECAP: What you need to know Information from the Department of Education Early Childhood Support Team

As we've shared on recent calls, a new application ("Request for Proposal" or RFP) for state-funded "seats" will be coming out soon. To support interested programs, we're planning a series of opportunities to learn more about what it means to participate as a state-funded preschool program, starting today with an introduction to "ECAP" and "Redding".

What is ECAP?

The Early Childhood Assistance Program (ECAP) is a state funding stream through the Department of Education (DOE) to provide preschool programming for eligible three- and four-year-old children. ECAP provides educational and comprehensive experiences for all participating children and their families.

Who are children eligible for ECAP funding?

ECAP supports unserved and underserved communities. Children qualify for ECAP based on family income or other risk factors, such as homelessness.

What are comprehensive experiences?

The ECAP policy states that participating programs must provide high-quality programming for at least 3.5 hours per day for at least 160 days per year. ECAP includes an identified set of policies and procedures based on the Head Start Program Performance Standards to outline high-quality programming. You can find them here: <u>bit.ly/3k3ZGmx</u>

December Podcast Episode

The third episode of X "Why" Z: Reflections from Early Childhood Education Professionals is now live and ready for listening. This new episode, "Where the Classroom Meets the Research," features a conversation with Chrishana M. Lloyd, a Ph.D. research scholar with Child Trends, and Sarah Reyes, owner of Seeds of Jesus Daycare in Wilmington, Del.

These early childhood education professionals have contrasting jobs in different states but share the same passion for the field, specifically focusing on providing young children with social and emotional support.

Chrishana's recent work includes Head Start's CARES program. She is implementing and evaluating three distinct classroom-based approaches for enhancing children's social-emotional development. One of the key takeaways is that sound classroom management is the foundation of promoting social and emotional development for children. According to Chrishana, this provides a framework for engaging with parents to discuss the importance of consistency.

Sarah provides her children with a bilingual setting, speaking Spanish to them beginning when they are infants. Sarah focuses on the cultural aspect of connecting with families from underserved communities. She supports the entire family's well-being by helping them partner with resources and giving them the tools to improve their circumstances.
