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Interested in an in-depth professional learning experience in 2024? Spring cohorts of popular DIEEC initiatives are forming now!

Key Practice Highlight

As part of Delaware's revised **Quality Improvement System** for early care and education programs in Delaware, the Office of Early Learning (OEL) has prioritized five key practices for fiscal year 2024. Over the course of the next five months, we will highlight one key practice each month and share examples of how Delaware programs are choosing to work towards higher levels of quality in the highlighted practice. This month we are highlighting **CQ-KP4** (classroom-based programs)/CQ-KP6 (FCC): Implements practices to recruit, maintain, and orient high-quality educators, consultants, and contractors (as needed). - Next Generation Learning Academy has developed a framework for increased compensation based on work performance, as well as a system that allows staff to provide feedback and take part in self-evaluation and goals for career development.
- Little Einstein's programs in Millsboro and Georgetown have developed their own model to support recruitment and retention.
- New Castle County Head Start has added an incentive to recruit qualified staff. Each month, staff receive a \$350 bonus, providing they are in good standing with attendance and are not on probation.

DIEEC Early Childhood Educator of the Year

The **DIEEC Early Childhood Educator of the Year Award** acknowledges and honors the critical role of early childhood teaching professionals in Delaware. Each year, we honor one center-based and one home-based teacher who exemplify the best in quality early care and education.

The 2024 award process is outlined below; please note that the process has changed from previous years.

- Applications are open from February 1 through March 1.
- Each applicant must nominate themselves by filling out an application form and submitting a letter of support from a parent of a current or former child in the program/classroom, the director of the program/center, or a colleague.
- Winners will be selected by a review panel consisting of members of the early childhood community. Applications will be reviewed anonymously.
- Winners and runners-up will be announced during Provider Appreciation Week in May.

Early Childhood Education Partner Highlight

Office of Early Childhood Intervention

The **Office of Early Childhood Intervention (OECI)** is a new workgroup within Delaware's Department of Education (DDOE). OECI joins Delaware's Early Childhood Support team alongside the Office of Early Learning (OEL) and the Office of Child Care Licensing (OCCL). Below we share OECI's vision and mission statements, as well as a list of the projects that OECI is currently working on.

Vision: At the Office of Early Childhood Intervention, we envision a community where all families have the resources and supports needed to help their children thrive. We, at the OECI, are committed to providing all eligible children birth to five and their families with high-quality, evidence-based early intervention and early childhood special education with integrity and accountability.

Mission: To ensure full implementation of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) through comprehensive policies and procedures, which drive access to early childhood intervention for all eligible children and their families by leveraging equitable supports, services, and community resources.

OECI's current projects include:

- Assuring the successful transfer of the IDEA Part C Early Intervention program for infants, toddlers and their families to DDOE from Delaware Health and Social Services (DHSS.)
- Assuring all components of the IDEA Part B Section 619, early childhood special education programs are implemented at local school districts under the General Supervision of the DDOE as required by the IDEA.
- Assuring the fulfillment of the statewide birth through age 5 Child Find project using developmental screening.

DIEEC Receives CCAMPIS Grant

Funding will provide access to high-quality, affordable child care for parents pursuing an education at University of Delaware

More than 20% of all college students are parents. However, research shows that lack of access to affordable child care often poses a significant barrier for parents attempting to complete a degree. CCAMPIS ("see-campus") stands for Child Care Access Means Parents In School. At UD, this grant will provide child care scholarships and family support for Pell Grant-eligible parents pursuing their education at the university. DIEEC will partner in this effort with UD's Early Learning Center, which provides research-informed care for infants and young children.
